

# A Note From Charlie:

To My Fellow JanSan Customers and Employees,

Last month I wrote to you on how to start lowering costs to meet these economic times. I really don't know if your employees realize the severity of this economic recession. It sort of reminds me of gas prices when everyone complains about the increases but do not take steps that will help lower costs and the reason for this is simple – the news media scares us to death on how high oil is going and in a few month the price of oil retreats and gas prices fall. Unfortunately, this recession is going to last at least a year or more. The biggest problem for Schools, and other facilities, is the loss of revenues from the communities, which means lower budget dollars. This step can help you overcome lower budgets because the PTA, government, as well as the average person, expect good looking and clean facilities.

## Green Cleaning

Do you know how much you pay for diluted chemicals? This may shock you but it's true. Most manufacturers will provide and install dilution control units at no charge. Some end users have said they don't want to be obligated to one manufacturer, therefore they want to pay for the units because they can purchase from anyone. Let me enlighten you because major manufacturers have distribution agreements with distributors that prohibit any other distributor from quoting lower prices on your chemicals. Do you really think you're getting the best price? Sometime ago I was doing in-service training at a high school and looked at the dilution system on the wall. I noticed the chemicals were not green and when I approached the Director of Facilities, I asked why they were not using green cleaning chemicals. He told me they were supposed to be green. He did check and to his dismay they were not green cleaning chemicals. Every bottle, container or pail will have a green certification label on it. Don't be fooled because Green Cleaning terminology is used loosely. You must make sure it's certified.

The following are diluted prices on chemicals you should be using in your daily cleaning operation. All products are green seal certified except disinfectants.

TerraGreen Glass Cleaner – dilutes 4 oz per gallon	\$1.42 per gallon diluted
TerraGreen Neutral Cleaner – dilutes ½ oz per gallon	\$.20 per gallon diluted
TerraGreen Degreaser – dilutes 1 oz per gallon	\$.20 per gallon diluted
Maxima 256 Disinfectant – dilutes ½ oz per gallon	\$.17 per gallon diluted

Remember chemical costs should not exceed 8% of your direct labor cost.

## Equipment

Facility Managers have told me they don't have money for equipment. I fully understand their dilemma but without equipment you can't lower cleaning costs. More schools are now looking into leasing equipment and buying it for \$1.00 at the end of the lease. Customers have told me it's just a finance program. This is true but how are you going to lower labor costs without up-dated equipment. Just what you will save on floor stripper and floor finish chemicals will pay for a new automatic floor scrubber and battery operated burnisher with dust control. You can lease these two machines for under \$500.00 per month.

As I explained last month, using Kaivac machines to clean restrooms will save you at least one and one half minutes per toilet, sink and urinal plus you will never have to machine scrub ceramic tile floors if you use it on a daily basis. It does not sound like much but when you add it all up your savings is thousands of dollars per year. You will never be completely sanitary clean because when you stick your mop in a bucket of disinfectant to wet the floor you are contaminating the solution. Kaivac has its one clean water reservoir and mixes with the chemical when it passes through the pressure hose. The solution is vacuumed after the fixtures have been cleaned. You must see it to believe but in this case change is necessary. Keep in mind anytime to bring change to a facility you will have grumbling because that's not the way they used to do it but it saves time and is sanitary clean.

## Value-Added Innovations

Thoroughly assessing a problem – learning what causes it and understanding its ramifications – is crucial to a problem's solution. When it comes to cleaning restrooms, manufacturers found that a thorough assessment of cleaning procedures is what led to some of the industries most appreciated innovations.

After spending many years evaluating restroom cleaning and the various procedures that it calls for, manufacturers found two overall problems. One was that there was a very high turnover among employees and therefore training was an issue within departments. The second was that many departments

rarely updated the tools they used to clean, many of which were not ergonomically designed.

In response, the industry soon saw the introduction of various ergonomically designed tools. These were designed to reduce back pain through the use of longer handles, which also keeps worker's faces away from the toilet bowl containing chemicals and fumes. Manufacturers comment that the use of these types of products will not only make cleaning easier and safer for workers, they will also result in worker retention.

Touch-free cleaning systems, such as Kaivac, were also introduced to help with restroom cleaning. These systems not only address the issue of cross-contamination, but can also reduce the amount of time it takes to clean a restroom.

Many of the improvements offered by manufacturers, suppliers, trainers and others in the industry have had a similar value-added impact on restroom cleaning. Microfiber mop heads and/or cloths not only release dirt more read-

ily but are easier to lift than traditional "spaghetti" mops because they weigh less. They're also more environmentally friendly because they use less water, and they're washable, reducing the amount of trash left at the end of the cleaning day.

Environmentally friendly green cleaning is a trend that has grown stronger in recent years. Many manufacturers have come out with tools that are designed specifically for recycling if they were ever to wear out. And instead of replacing the entire tool when something breaks, many manufacturers provide replacement parts so you don't have to throw the entire tool away.

In addition, many workers use squeegees and water to clean restroom mirrors and windows. The benefit? Departments will use less chemicals and wont find trash bins filled with paper towels as a result of cleaning.

Cleaning chemicals should also be considered in green cleaning. There are many manufacturers that provide cleaning products certified with Green Seal. These new innovations – and they happen frequently – make it easier for companies to except green cleaning into their programs.

For all the innovations in the industry, the need for common sense and attention to detail is as great as ever. Properly training employees, for example, is a task that experts say should always be at the top of a building manager's to-do list. To help, there are industry courses such as those offered by ISSA, as well as training services provided by manufacturers and distributors.


